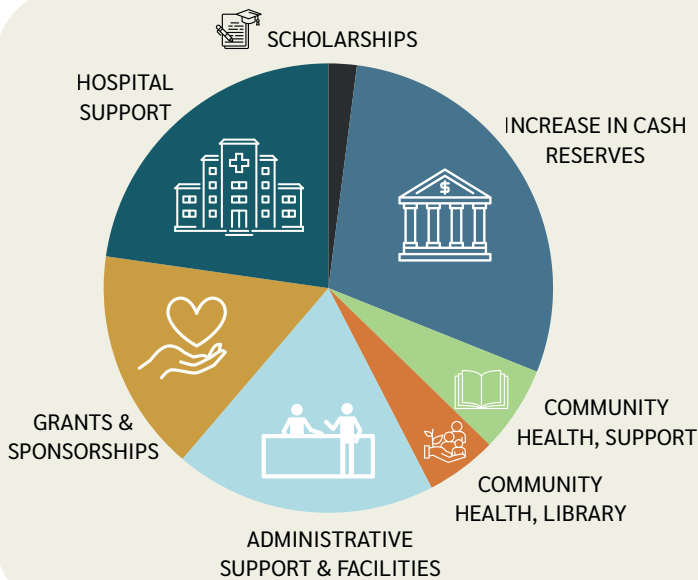

The District's expenditure budget contains four internal departments:

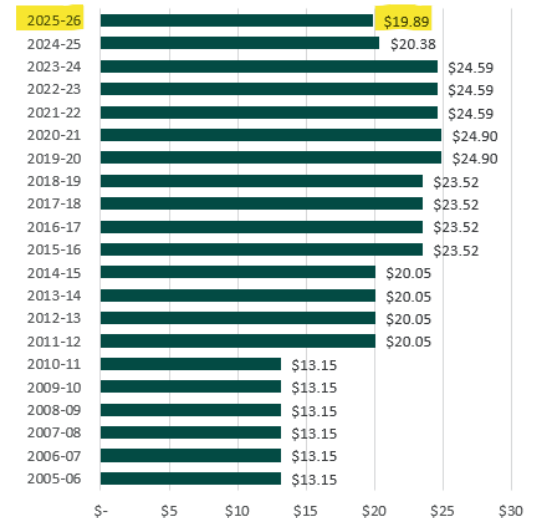
COMMUNITY HEALTH (LIBRARY) includes all of the public services available through the District's Health & Wellness Library.

COMMUNITY HEALTH (SUPPORT) includes Hospital Support, Grants & Sponsorships, Scholarships, and other strategic initiatives.

ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT includes governance, legal, technology, and finance.

FACILITIES include capital improvements, and the maintenance and repairs needed to support the District's community health programs.

The Grossmont Healthcare District values financial transparency and is responsible for sound stewardship of taxpayer funds. This chart shows the change in GHD's special tax assessment rate history. Tax revenues are used to repay debt service (principal and interest) on the **\$247 million in voter-approved bonds** for improvement and expansion of facilities at Sharp Grossmont Hospital. The Board of Directors voted in 2025 to decrease the tax rate to **\$19.89** for every \$100K of assessed value, marking the third reduction for local taxpayers in the past five years.



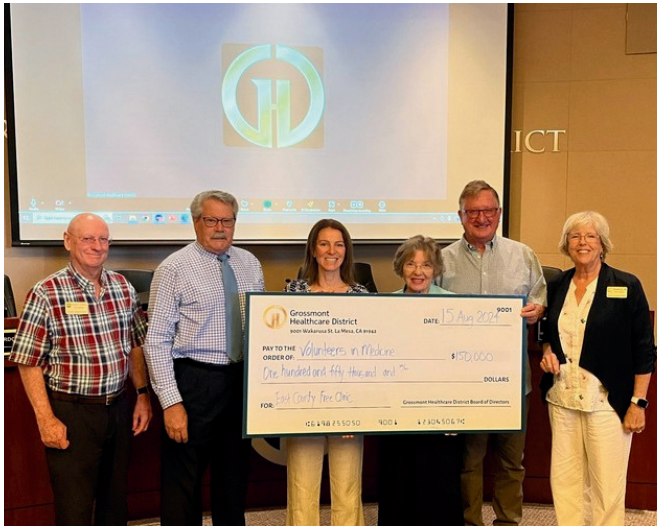
The District received the **San Diego County Taxpayer Association's 2024 Grand Golden Watchdog Award** in Fiscal Stewardship for a 17.1% reduction of the rate on a voter-approved tax to pay for bonds issued for hospital improvements.



In August 11, 2025, GHD also received two **SDRMA President's Special Acknowledgment Awards** to recognize members with no "paid" claims in the property/liability programs and no paid workers' compensation claims during the prior five consecutive program years (2020-2025).

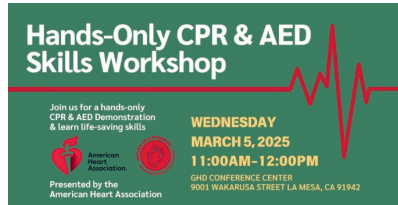

Increase in amounts for Post-Secondary Scholarships:

The Board approved an increase in the amounts awarded for the Richard J. Bea, Health Tech, Behavioral Health, and Advanced Practice scholarships this year.

HEALTH PATHWAYS

GROSSMONT UNION HIGH SCHOOL PARTNERSHIP

With support from the Grossmont Healthcare District, students at eight local high schools have access to Health Pathways opportunities, including the Health Exploration Summer Internship (HESI) at the Sharp Grossmont Hospital; summer CNA, MA, and EMT training programs at the Health Occupations Center; extension learning and volunteer opportunities; and American Heart Association Basic Life Support & CPR certification training. The District held three field trips for about 90 Health Pathways students, with assistance from volunteer SDSU nursing students. They learned about the importance of health and digital literacy, participated in a scavenger hunt in the Health & Wellness Library, and were introduced to some of the Library's health and wellness programs.

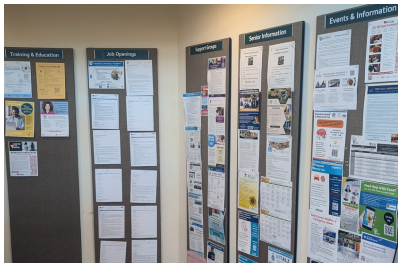

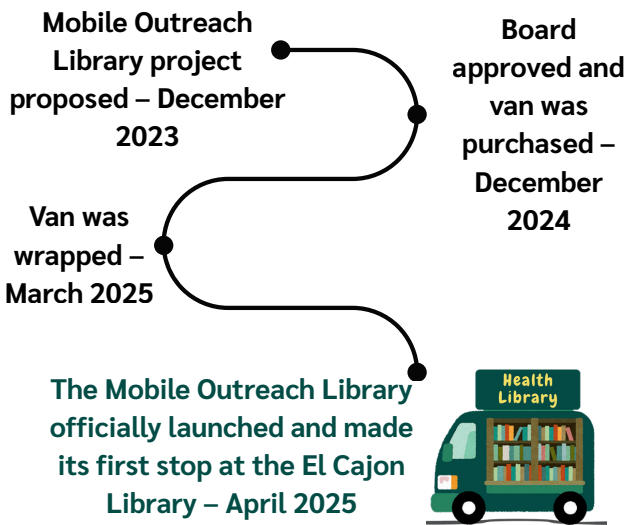
MOBILE OUTREACH LIBRARY

The Board of the Grossmont Healthcare District provided continued support of the **Rural Post-Hospital Discharge Program**, in partnership with the County of San Diego and Sharp Grossmont Hospital. This voluntary home visitation program offers residents in rural East County who are discharged from Sharp Grossmont Hospital with in-home follow up visits by a Sharp nurse and a County CAL FIRE paramedic. They conduct a home and property safety assessment, coordinate necessary medical or social supports, and link patients to other helpful resources. Building upon the success of the program in its first two years, it has now been expanded and covers residents living in Alpine, Boulevard, Campo, Descanso, Guatay, Jacumba, Pine Valley, Potrero, and Tecate.

The District continues to convene monthly meetings of the **Transfer of Care Collaborative**, a working group whose primary objective is to reduce the time required to transition a patient's care from an ambulance to the emergency department at the Sharp Grossmont Hospital, the busiest emergency department in the county. Changes implemented through the group have already resulted in a significant reduction in "offload delays," which translate to reduced emergency department wait times overall.

GHD's Board of Directors also supported the expansion of the the **Nurse Navigation program**, first piloted by the City of El Cajon, and expanded in its second pilot year to cover much of East County in FY 24-25. This pilot diverts some 9-1-1 calls from specific zip codes to a triage nurse for evaluation, to determine if a lower level of care would better meet the person's needs than an ambulance transport to the emergency department.



HEALTHCARE WORKFORCE

COMMUNITY HEALTH

In June, 22 local Health Pathways students from Grossmont Union High School District schools completed the Health Exploration Summer Internship (HESI) program at Sharp Grossmont Hospital, and an additional 59 students completed certificate programs at the Health Occupations Center in Santee. These training programs provide local high school students with crucial real-world experience and certifications that can help them gain immediate employment as a Medical Assistant, Certified Nursing Assistant, or Emergency Medical Technician.

HOSPITAL SUPPORT

COMMUNITY HEALTH

The District's investments in Sharp Grossmont Hospital, a public hospital owned by East County taxpayers and operated by Sharp HealthCare since 1991, totaled \$3,100,660 in FY 24-25. This includes funds for the Intergovernmental Transfer (IGT) program, which compensates Sharp HealthCare for some of the hospital's financial losses due to uninsured and underinsured Medicaid-covered services, as well as the sponsorship of several hospital fundraising events. In April of 2024, the Board approved a commitment of \$8 million in IGT for FY 25-26.

Additionally, Sharp HealthCare was awarded a grant through the California Health Care Foundation's Song-Brown Program, for the establishment of a new Family Medicine Residency program at Sharp Grossmont Hospital, to train new medical doctors in high-quality primary care that meets the needs of East County's diverse communities. The District provided a matching grant of \$500,000 for this important project and committed up to \$10 million in future support, which is expected to welcome its first Family Medicine Residents in 2027.



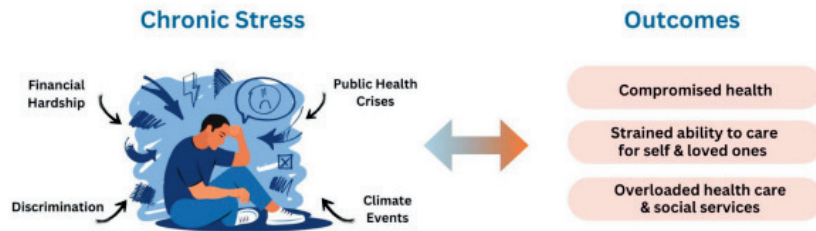

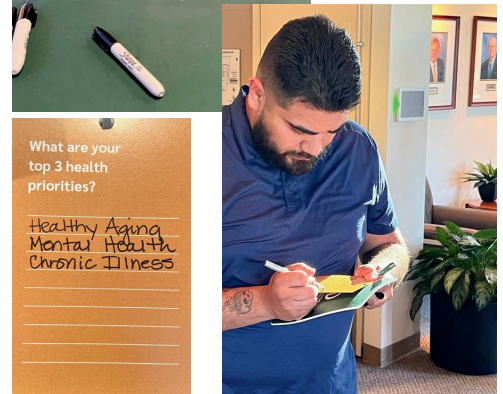
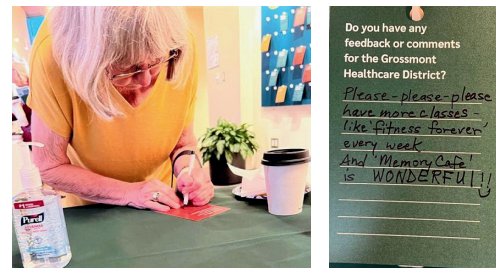

COMMUNITY HEALTH NEEDS ASSESSMENT & COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS EVENT

Every three years, the District supports in partnership with the Hospital Association of San Diego & Imperial Counties and all of the region’s hospitals, a comprehensive Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA), with findings used by hospitals, providers, and local governmental agencies to set strategic priorities. This year’s assessment identified chronic, debilitating stress as a major factor impacting our region’s health. East County voices were heard loud and clear, with about 23% of those surveyed and interviewed for the assessment living in our region. The complete 2025 San Diego CHNA and all of its supporting documents is available at the link.



On April 29th, 2025, about 70 residents, elected officials, and other community stakeholders participated in our “East County Health: A Community Conversation” event. We discussed the preliminary findings of the CHNA and gathered feedback about our attendees’ top health concerns and suggestions for improving their community’s health. Common concerns expressed included mental health, chronic disease, access to affordable and healthy foods, spaces for physical activity, and housing.



FACILITIES HIGHLIGHTS

ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT & FACILITIES

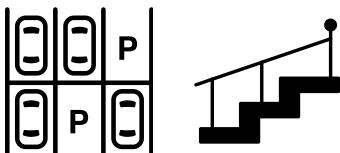
The District ensures its facilities are well-maintained and safe for public use. The District has a total of five facility spaces available for reservation and community use: the Conference Center Auditorium, the Library Conference Room, the Library Meeting Room, and two Library Study Rooms. Several updates were made in FY 24-25 to both exterior and interior spaces:



The shed (additional storage unit) project was completed in Fall 2024 to improve event and outreach operations. The shed stores large, oversized equipment and items for outreach and events. With easier transport to outreach vehicles and between District facilities, the additional space helps staff continue to provide quality events to the community.

Other projects included:

- Restriping the parking lot
- Adding handrails in the courtyard
- Converting the exterior light to LED around the campus
- Improved landscaping

Another aspect of improving the District's administrative operations is setting the foundation with proper IT infrastructure. The District switched to a new IT company for its services for a complete reboot of the District's systems, including a comprehensive integration with Microsoft SharePoint for improved offline access and sharing capabilities.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT & FACILITIES

The Directors of the Grossmont Healthcare District provide vision and strategy for a staff of fifteen employees and two interns (fourteen full-time equivalent employees), who execute on the various initiatives described throughout this report. The District encourages staff and Board professional development, and provides financial support for education and training programs that expand relevant knowledge and expertise. In FY 24-25, staff completed the following trainings and programs:



The American Society on Aging's Social Impact in Gerontology professional certificate program – exploring the intersection of innovation and social impact within the field of gerontology, aiming to equip professionals, researchers and advocates with the knowledge and skills to drive positive change for older adults.



The East County Regional Chamber of Commerce's East County Leadership program with special honors – supporting the mission of utilizing the unique perspective, experience, and talent of its participants to identify, mentor and prepare East County leaders of tomorrow.



The Specialization in Consumer Health Information from the American Medical Library Association (Levels I & II) – acquiring the expertise in providing health information services to consumers in all 8 core competencies. Courses include the basics plus extra training in health literacy, technology and health, and ethical and legal issues.



Two District staff recently finished graduate degree programs, earning a Master of Public Administration and a Master of Library and Information Science.



Additionally, staff attended conferences and workshops throughout the year offered by the Association of California Healthcare District, and the California Special Districts Association. All Library staff participated in trainings throughout the year provided by Library 2.0, and were provided the opportunity to attend the American Library Association's annual conference, which was held in San Diego in 2024.

By investing in ongoing professional development at every level of the organization, the Grossmont Healthcare District demonstrates its commitment to the excellence and innovation required to deliver on our mission of improving the health and wellbeing of the East County communities we serve.
